Course Fees

Fees may be paid online or by check. Individual course fees range from \$25-\$40 per course. The Audubon day trip is an additional \$40 for transportation and entrance fees. If paying by check, please mail your registration form and payment directly to the WISE office.

Registration

Registration begins May 6, 2019 for 2018-2019 WISE members. On May 13, 2019 non-WISE members are welcome to register for courses. All participants must pay all course fees prior to attending class. Registration will remain open while there is available space in the course.

You can register online and receive a confirmation email for courses in which you are enrolled. Online registration is strongly recommended (website information on page 3).

You can register over the phone. Call the WISE Office (please have your list of course selections and credit card in hand) during office hours (office information on page 3).

You can register by mail by returning the Registration form (page 7) or return the form and check before May 6 (address on page 3). The Office staff will manually enter in your course selections starting at 9:00am on May 6 for members and May 13 for non-members. **Please note that we cannot guarantee a seat in any course.**

Answers to WISE FAQ

Course Selection: WISE members and nonmembers may register for as many courses as they wish to pay for. There are many interesting courses listed in this catalog, and we ask that you carefully review each topic before making your choices. If you find that you cannot attend a course that you selected, please notify the WISE office to have yourself removed from the class roster so another member may attend. Your consideration in this matter is appreciated.

Waitlist: If a class is full, you can contact the WISE Office with a request to be placed on a waitlist. If a space becomes available, the first member on the waitlist will receive a notification. If you wish to be removed from the waitlist, please contact the WISE Office.

Holidays: WISE follows the Assumption College holiday calendar. If the college is closed, the WISE Office will also close on that day. Members are informed of holiday closures by email and on the WISE Office voicemail. Please note that Assumption College is closed on Fridays in July. Cancellations: Any individual class cancellations and make-up class meetings are announced by email and on the WISE Office voicemail: 508-767-7513.

Courses may be cancelled due to low enrollment or other unusual circumstances. If all meetings of a course are cancelled, a refund will be issued.

SUMMER 2019

S1. Weird History - The Curse of Darwin, the Hunt for Witches and Other Topics
Mondays & Wednesdays 1:00 - 2:30 pm
Dates: June 10, 12, 17, 19, 24 Fee: \$40

This course will look at the general way historians evaluate historical evidence and arrive at reasonable conclusions. It will also look at how science and history are related in the search for consensus and how this nexus serves to answer far-fetched historical claims. Specifically, we will look at the historian's craft from Thucydides to Kuhn; the persistence of witchcraft (not all witches live in Salem); the curse of Darwin and his theory of evolution; the Holocaust as seen as a Zionist Conspiracy; and the fake moon shot - Disney's production of the moon landing.

CLASS LIMIT: 65

GROUP LEADER: <u>Dr. James (Jed) Watters</u> is a former Assumption Professor of history and retired naval officer. He has taught numerous courses for WISE.

S2. Examining Worcester's Architecture Tuesdays 10:00 -11:30 am

Dates: June 11, 18, 25, July 9, 16 Fee: \$40 This course will encourage participants to reevaluate the landscape (buildings, parks, cemeteries) with which we interact every day. Let us introduce you to the stories and architecture that makes Worcester like no other place. Examine aspects of Worcester's rise to prominence in the 19th and early 20th centuries; discover the people who made it happen. Learn more about the architecture, history, and notoriety of Worcester's buildings and neighborhoods. You will enjoy access to areas not open to the general public. Weekly walks include walking by the canal; Crown Hill and the Greek Revival Style; Worcester Common and Worcester City Hall; Bancroft Heights and Bancroft Tower; and Hope Cemetery. Participation on these walks

involves walking for an hour and half with some stairs and hills at specified locations.

GROUP LEADER: Preservation Worcester Docents with expertise in each of the neighborhoods and Megan Blomgren, Director of Education

S3. Floral Paintings Through the Ages Tuesdays 2:45 - 4:15 pm

Dates: June 11, 18, 25, July 9, 16 <u>Fee: \$40</u> Flowers have been an inspiration to artists for centuries. In the class we will explore change

centuries. In the class we will explore changes in artistic style for more than four centuries; from the nature paintings of the Renaissance to the 21st century. We will examine the exquisite floral paintings of the Dutch artists of the 17th century and the importance of florals in the 18th century during the reign of Marie Antoinette and King George III. Floral art from the 19th century will be illustrated in works by Delacrois, Fantin-Latour, Cassatt, Morisot, and Van Gogh. The flower paintings of Georgia O'Keefe and Joan Mitchell reflect modernism of the 20th century.

GROUP LEADER: Martha Chiarchiaro has lectured in the history of art for more than 30 years. She received her Masters' degree in the History of Art from Williams College and provides a variety of art history lectures at the Worcester Art Museum, garden clubs, and other local cultural organizations.

S4. Memoirs: A Personal Journey Wednesdays 11:00 – 12:30 pm Dates: June 12, 19, 26, July 10, 17

During the five-week course you will embark on a personal journey through the stories from your

life. You will learn the techniques and structures of the memoir writing process. This class will be a safe place to write and share. Come start your journey this summer.

GROUP LEADER: Mary Botticelli Christensen, Ed.D. holds a doctorate in Education from the University of Hartford, CT; a MA in English from Trinity College in Hartford, CR; a BA in English from UConn; and has 48 years of teaching experience. Besides her love of literature, she is passionate about teaching writing to all ages at all levels of ability.

FOR THE FIRST CLASS: Bring either a writing notebook, chrome book, or laptop, depending on your preference for writing and editing. S5. Introduction to Theater Improvisation Thursdays 10:00 – 11:30 pm

Dates: June 13, 20, 27, July 11, 18 Fee: \$40
Theater improvisation can be funny, heartening, and insightful. This participatory class offers an introduction to the creative opportunities and laughter possible with classic theater improvisation. The workshop covers projects, theater games, and supportive theater habits. If you've ever had stage fright but want to be less shy, or even yearned for more time on stage but haven't found the place, both needs can be met in this fun and kind-hearted setting. Each workshop period opens with physical warm-ups and thought-provoking warm-ups. Each class closes with a review of successes and guided relaxation.

GROUP LEADER: Margaret McCandless has been teaching theater and improvisation for many years, most recently on the faculty at Bancroft School in Worcester where she taught drama,

scenery painting and design and directed 5th grade plays. Her classroom atmosphere helps adults as well as children use theater improvisation to meet various needs such as helping shy people become more at ease speaking before a group. Primarily, Margaret's Theater Improvisation Workshop is fun. Whether participants are beginners or experienced in theater improvisation, the process brings people together and enriches creative vitality.

S6. Celebrating Our Favorite Poems Thursdays 1:00 – 2:30

Each of us has favorite poems we cherish. While the poems themselves have not changed, we have. Thus, it may prove interesting to look again at these poems and examine the ways in which they continue to enrich our lives. New insights may accompany this effort. At the first session, the Group Leader will introduce his favorite poems. Class members are invited to submit titles of their favorite poems which will be drawn from a hat. The selected poems will be discussed in the remaining sessions. Members are not obligated to lead the discussion of their poem(s).

GROUP LEADER: Jim Foley is Professor of English Emeritus from Worcester State University with interests in Shakespeare, 19th century American Literature, and drama of all periods. Among his most rewarding teaching experiences was his course, Introduction of Poetry, which reached a variety of students not majoring in English (and skeptical that poetry offered them anything of value). Some minds were changed for the better!

REQUIRED READING: Poems will be distributed to class members.

FOR THE FIRST CLASS: Bring one or two (or more) of the titles of your favorite poems.

S7. The Vision and the Word: a Poetry Writing Workshop

Friday 1:00 - 5:00 pm

Date: June 14 Fee: \$25

Participants will "fall into a work of art" and begin poems which emerge from the work they are visualizing and come from their own personal experience. We will work with imagery which is the most translatable aspect of poetry; it is the universal language. Imagery shows first and then, with its literary statement implied inside, it tells. There will be two periods of writing which are stimulated by a prompt and followed by discussion of each person's work. In the workshop you will create a workable draft of a poem.

GROUP LEADER: Eve Rifkah has an MFA in Writing from Vermont College of the Arts. She has run many workshops in poetry writing over the years, the last in 2018 as part of the Stanley Kunitz Home summer writing program. She was editor of *Diner*, a literary journal for seven years and taught English writing and literature on the college level. She has many publications including two full length books of historical poetry and two chapbooks.

NO REQUIRED BOOKS FOR THE WORKSHOP: Bring paper and pens or pencils.

S8. Down the Blackstone with MA Audubon Friday 9:00 - 4:00 pm

Date: June 21 **Fee:** \$80 (class +fees) Class participants will be introduced to the many cultural, historical, and natural resources of The John H. Chafee Blackstone River National Heritage Corridor, officially established as a permanent National Park in 2015. It is a region of nearly 400,000 acres located within Worcester County in central Massachusetts and Providence County in northern Rhode Island. The National Corridor was designated by an Act of Congress on November 10, 1986 to preserve and interpret for present and future generations the unique history and significant value of the Blackstone River Valley. We will travel down the Blackstone to visit several key locations and visitor destinations along the river that are part of the National Heritage Corridor. We will travel by

bus for the day. There will be a \$40 fee included to cover the transportation and admission fees. Bring your own packed lunch. Stops include Slater Mill and Blackstone Valley Visitor Center in Pawtucket, RI; Captain Wilbur Kelly House Museum in Lincoln, RI; and Museum of Work and Culture, Woonsocket, RI, among others. LOCATION: Meet at Assumption College alongside the Testa Building and the Parking Structure.

GROUP LEADER: <u>Deb Carey</u> is Director of Central Sanctuaries for the Massachusetts Audubon Society. <u>Donna Williams</u> is on the Blackstone River Heritage Corridor Board of Directors, former Commission Chair, and former member of Mass Audubon Blackstone River Advocacy.

S9. A Skeptic's Guide to American History Mondays & Wednesdays 10:00 - 11:30 am Dates: July 8, 10, 15, 17, 22 Fee: \$40

American history is still often taught and understood through the lens of American exceptionalism. The alternative can seem like a litany of abuses and horrors. Somewhere in between lies the truth; a history full of dark and divisive events and moments, but also of impressive and inspiring stories and figures. In this class we will examine a handful of focal histories to consider both sides, and model how a skeptic can approach and engage the worst and best of American history. Topics to be focused on include: the Puritans, the Revolution, the Frontier, Women's Suffrage, and the Greatest Generation.

GROUP LEADER: Ben Railton is Professor of English Studies and American Studies at Fitchburg State University. He is the author of five books, most recently, We the People: The 500-Year Battle over Who is an American.
